***FarmFLOW* Funding now flowing**

Funding is now available to South East Queensland landholders for land and water management projects that will help with sediment and nutrient management on their properties.

Applications are open for *FarmFLOW* Best Management Practice (BMP) Incentives in targeted South East Queensland (SEQ) catchments.

The *FarmFLOW* project is led by Queensland Primary Industries and Fisheries (QPIF), and funded by the Queensland and Australian governments' \$8 million SEQ Healthy Country Partnership program.

QPIF Sustainable Production Systems leader Brian Stockwell said applications were sought from primary producers in the Logan-Albert, Lockyer, Bremer and Pumicestone catchments who wanted to adopt best practices in sediment and nutrient management.

"Incentives funding are open to a range of farm types including graziers, horticulturalists and turf producers," Mr Stockwell said.

"Whether you are on a 5ha or 500ha property, if you are a commercial or semi-commercial farmer, you may be eligible for an incentive payment to improve farm management practices.

"This incentive program is aimed at improving and maintaining sustainable production by keeping soil and nutrients on the land while minimising the potential for off-site movement of sediment, and in turn protecting our waterways and wetlands."

Mr Stockwell said project applications should demonstrate an improvement in agricultural production as well as waterway health, which complemented existing Farm Management Systems (FMS), Grazing Land Management (GLM) or other Property Management Systems (PMS).

"The scheme will provide funding on average of \$3500 per property, however, larger projects or those with multiple properties may apply for up to \$10,000," he said.

"There are a range of incentives that could be funded, for example: fencing watercourses/wetlands; gully rehabilitation; establishing inter-row cover; canopy management ;grassing headlands to create filter strips; improving nutrient efficiency through equipment upgrades; constructing sediment detention ponds; or enhancing the filter function of wetlands."

A new BMP 'ABCD' Framework is now available for SEQ producers to assess their current practices and identify which of these may attract an incentive payment. QPIF extension officers are available to help with this process.

Applications for Incentives open 31 August 2009 and close 21 September 2009.
